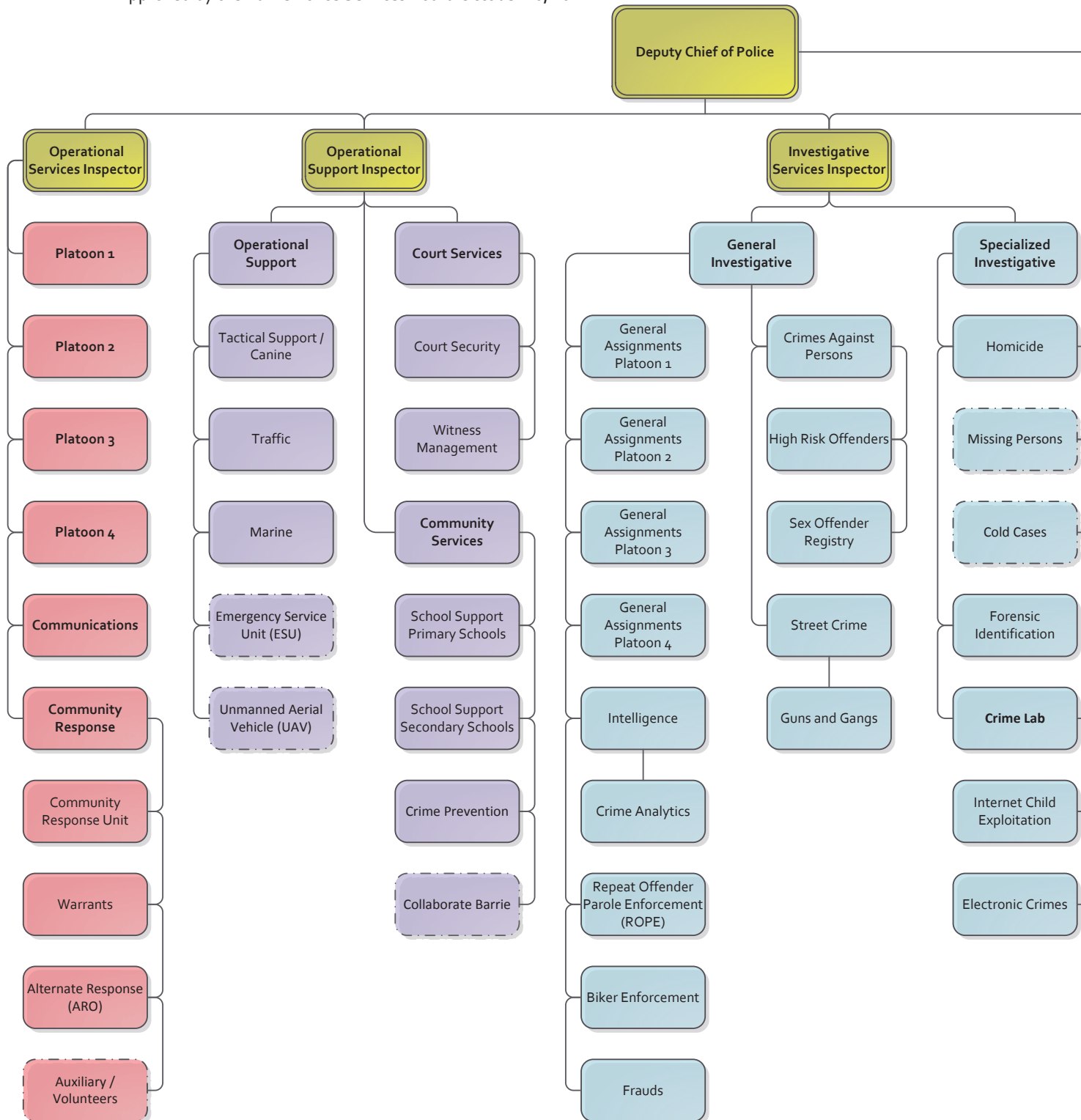

ORGANIZATIONAL CHART

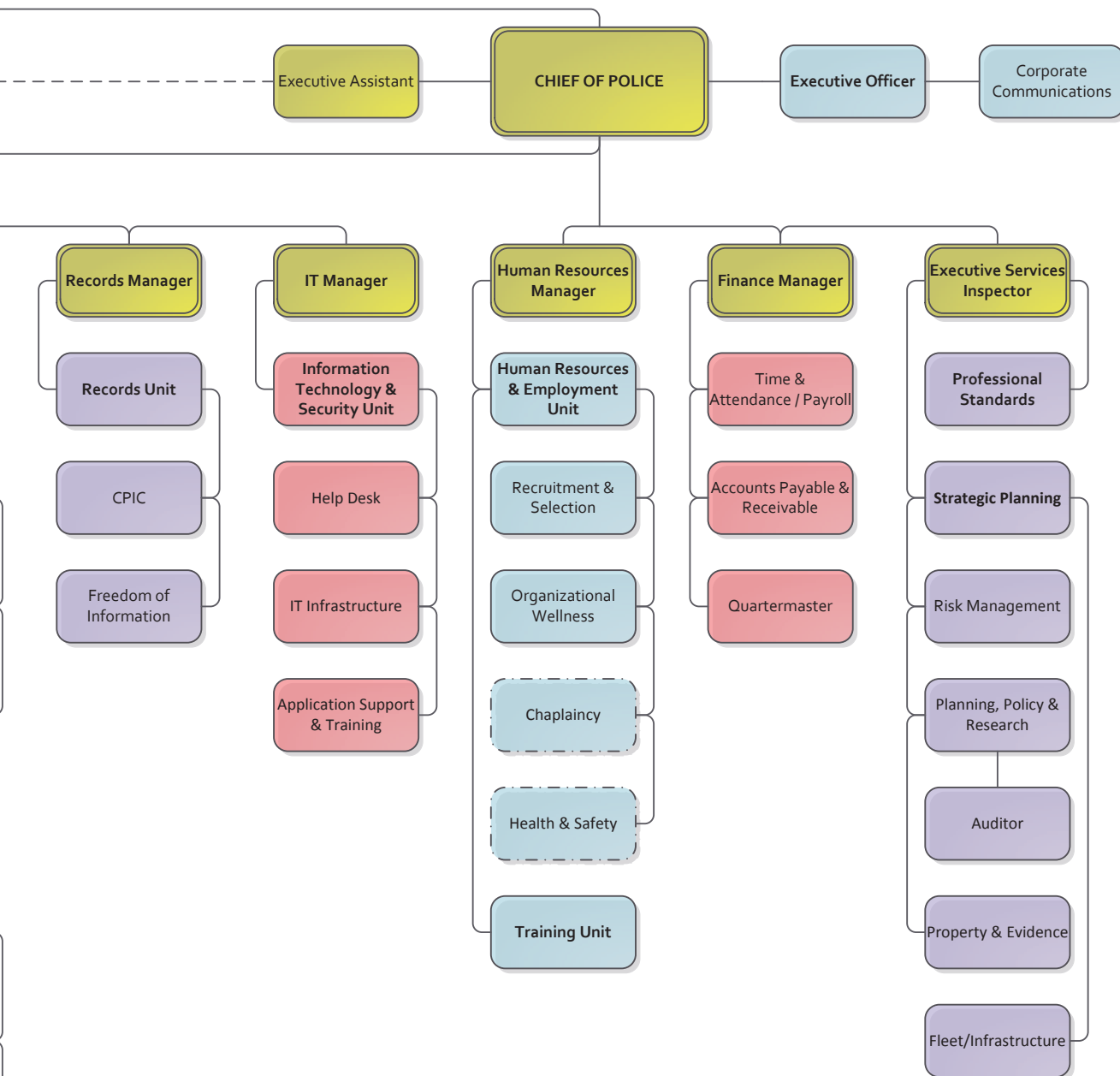

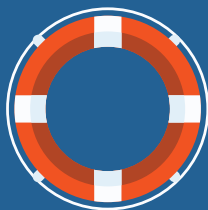

EMERGENCY SERVICES CAMPUS



During the first several months of 2017, the Barrie Police Service in collaboration with the Barrie Fire Emergency Services and the County of Simcoe Paramedic Services, helped create a Validation Study for the Barrie Simcoe Emergency Services Campus.

The team utilized a delivery approach called Integrated Project Delivery, which integrates all stakeholders and a team of construction professionals throughout the various phases of planning, design and construction.

On July 24, 2017, Barrie City Council approved a motion to proceed with the Barrie Simcoe Emergency Services Campus in a phased approach, building the main headquarters and maintenance bays and deferring the training building to a future date.

Since receiving approval, the Team continues to meet and have used the principles of LEAN Construction to maximize value and reduce waste. The campus, which is located at 110 Fairview Road, will accommodate the Barrie Fire

and Emergency Services Communication Centre, a logistics hub for the County of Simcoe Paramedic Services and the Barrie Police Services Headquarters.

The realization of a new centralized police facility will create efficiencies, which will ensure the Barrie Police Service can accomplish our core functions in carrying out our mission to provide professional, accountable and sustainable police services.

The campus approach also allows all three services to work in unison to provide programming and services to our community with efficiency while being economically responsible.

The Barrie Police Service helped contribute to the design and development of the campus and on November 1, 2017, a ground breaking ceremony was held.

Construction on the site began in late 2017 and it is anticipated that the building will be operational in the spring of 2020.

- 14% unable to identify a substance within the meaning of the CDSA
- 19% contained fentanyl

The law enforcement community is no stranger to the opioid problem as heroin, OxyContin, and other opioid based drugs have been around for decades. The appetite for pharmaceuticals in Canada has grown exponentially, with Canada ranking as the second largest per capita consumer of pharmaceutical opioids (United States ranking first).

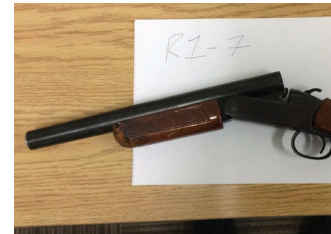
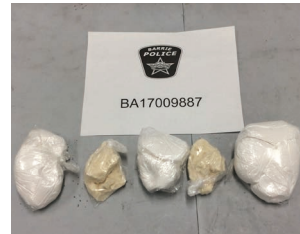
Simcoe Muskoka and in particular Barrie, have a high rate of Opioid related overdoses and overdose deaths as compared to other parts of the Province. As a result, the Barrie Police Service has been an active member in both the Barrie Drug Awareness Partnership (BDAP) and the Simcoe Muskoka Opioid Strategy (SMOS) in an effort to continue community collaboration to address the Opioid Crisis. We also sit as an advisor on the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit – Harm Reduction Advisory.



First Responder Training

In 2017 our Frontline Officers were issued and trained in the use of tourniquets, pressure bandages, hemostatic agents and the lifesaving Naloxone nasal spray.

Standardized Field Sobriety Tests (SFST)

In 2017, the Barrie Police Service trained three officers in the Standardized Field Sobriety Testing and two officers were trained as Standardized Field Sobriety Instructors.

The Barrie Police have seven Drug Recognition Evaluators, who conduct Drug Recognition Evaluations in accordance to the standards set out by the International Association of Chiefs of Police. In the 2017, the Barrie Police Drug Recognition Evaluators conducted 32 Drug Recognition Evaluations, which increased from 26 evaluations in 2016.

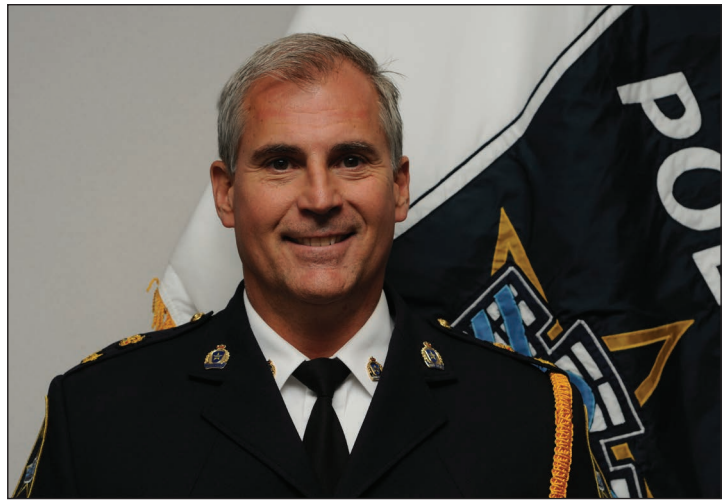
New Deputy Chief welcomed (back) to Barrie

Deputy Chief Bruce E. Carlson retired after 34 years of dedicated service

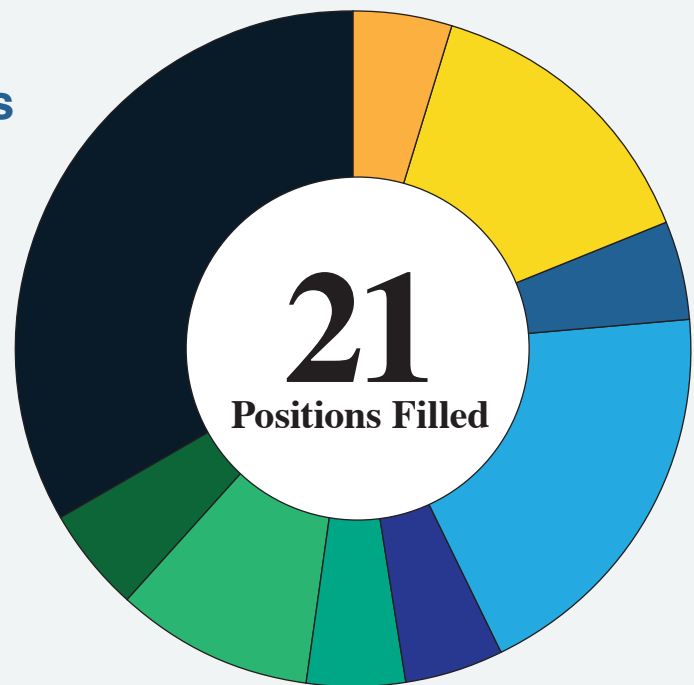

Members of the Barrie Police Service and the Police Services Board wish Deputy Carlson much happiness and enjoyment in his well-deserved retirement.

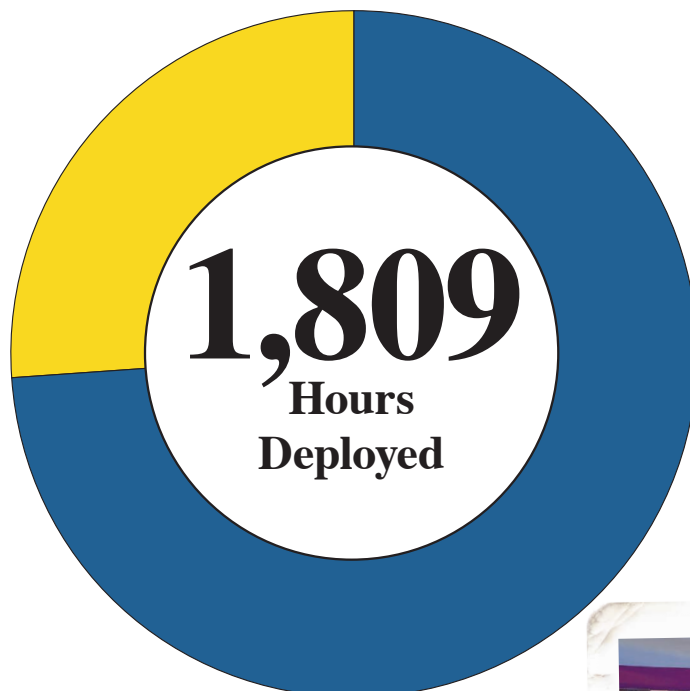
